Exam Success 2023

On behalf of the staff and governors of Culcheth High School, I would like to congratulate our Year 11 students on their excellent GCSE exam results. There have also been some fantastic individual performances, which reflect the hard work of the students in their GCSE studies. I would like to take this opportunity to thank the students for their efforts and wish them all the very best in their next steps.

We are delighted with and very proud of our students' achievements, and I would like to thank all the staff for their dedication and hard work which supported this level of achievement through the GCSE courses.

Finally, a big thank you to all the parents and carers who have supported the students and school to help our young people achieve this level of success in their GCSE examinations.

Parking Around School

School Uniform 2023-24

School uniform for 2023-24 has not changed, however there are a number of points that parents/carers need to be aware of:

1. The 'School Shoe Guidance' that remains applicable for September 2023 is available on the school website, along with the 2023-24 uniform statement.
2. Hairstyles must be suitable for school. (Extreme hairstyles including patterns, lines or indentations shaved or sculptured onto the hair are not acceptable. Other examples include 'Mohicans', 'Skinheads' and inappropriate use of natural coloured dye to create clashing and/or extreme hair colour patterns. Non-natural colours are not acceptable.)
3. Excessive make-up is unnecessary and inappropriate and must not be worn; this includes false eyelashes and fake tan

Duke of Edinburgh Bronze Expedition

Over the last weekend of the summer term, a group of Year 10 students, supported by Mr Nolan, Mr Bolton, Mr Hiller and Mrs Andrews, embarked on a challenging Bronze Duke of Edinburgh expedition. They hiked over Winter Hill and around Rivington, carrying their own food, water, and equipment on their backs, and navigated their way through the countryside using maps and compasses. It was a gruelling test of their endurance, resilience, and teamworking skills. Despite the constant rain, which made the terrain more slippery and the paths more treacherous, our students rose to the occasion and performed admirably.

The rain started on Saturday afternoon, just as our students arrived at the top of Winter Hill. A number managed to stay relatively dry by walking through the woodlands to find some shelter, whereas others managed to time it well to eat lunch in the school minibuses at a checkpoint and stay out of the showers. By late afternoon most had arrived at the campsite and had to set up their tents in the pouring rain, with puddles forming around them and the wind howling through the trees. Evening meals were prepared under a parachute in the woods to try and fend off the rain and allow students to dry out.

The next morning, the rain continued to drizzle. Our students had to pack their bags carefully, making sure they had everything they needed for the day ahead, but not carrying too much weight that would slow them down. They knew that they had to stay focused and alert until the end; they succeeded. They finished the hike within the time limit, and to everyone's delight, they all received their DofE certificates and badges. They had passed the test with flying colours, showing their determination, perseverance, and adaptability. And they had also learned some valuable lessons about themselves and their abilities, as well as about nature and the environment.

Thank you to all the staff for giving up their weekend and the students for persevering through the horrible weather, and to the parents for helping students get prepared for the weekend.



London Visit

At the start of July, the Business Studies, Computing and Media Departments ran a three-day visit to London with the Year 10 students. During the visit, students were able to see how micro businesses are run at London Borough Markets, the impact of technology in business, business marketing and media with a visit to the Harry Potter Studios, and see where some of the major legislation that impact our country are made.

Students visited some of the key landmarks such as The Princess Diana memorial in Hyde Park, Harrods, Tower of London, Westminster, Downing Street, Buckingham Palace and many more along the way. To give students a break from the 20,000 steps a day schedule, students were taken on a Thames River Cruise to see the capital in all its glory from a different viewpoint and if that wasn't a great way to see the city, a trip up the Pudding Lane Monument (including all 311 steps of it) gave students a fantastic, almost bird's eye view. Students and staff all had a fantastic time on the visit.

Managing Anxiety

The first few weeks of school are often the cause of anxiety, and not just for Year 7 students! Here's a great poster to help explain the brain. Did you know your cortex (the bit that makes you think rationally and sensibly) is not fully developed until the age of 25!?

Your amygdala always takes over when you feel threatened - even if the threat is not real. So, when you see something on the floor and you freeze/jump....because it's a massive spider...that's your amygdala taking over - ready to fight or flight (run), but then the cortex takes over and says, "relax its a bit of fluff". Your heart is racing....then you slowly calm down and feel a bit embarrassed (that's normal - your amygdala does not care about how you might feel afterwards).

When you are feeling anxious, it's important to try to do calming, mindfulness techniques, so your cortex can take back over and help to calm you. It's not easy sometimes. Especially when you are not sure what it is that is causing you to feel anxious.

HEADSPACE is a really useful app to use for mindfulness, and we will be learning more about mental health next month (for World Mental Health Day in October) but if you are struggling, always reach out for help.

Amygdala
“The Jumpy Superhero”

Tries to protect us at all costs, but often mistakes stress for real threats and stops the Prefrontal Cortex from getting the information it needs to help us make good choices. When the Amygdala is calm, it gives the PFC what it needs.

The Brain

Prefrontal Cortex
“The Smart One”

Figures out stuff for us and helps us make good, well balanced choices. The PFC also sends and retrieves memories to and from the Hippocampus. When the Amygdala is upset, the PFC cannot help us.

Hippocampus
“The Librarian”


The Hippocampus stores and recalls memories. When the Amygdala is upset, poor Hippocampus cannot store memories or properly bring them to mind.

Mindfulness To The Rescue

Mindfulness helps us to calm down, and this, in turn, calms the amygdala so that it allows the information flow to the prefrontal cortex—that part of our brains that helps us make good choices. When we're calm, we can more easily be mindful and make good choices.

Paris Visit

Our Year 10 and 11 students had a fantastic time on our MFL visit to Paris which took place at the beginning of July. We arrived by plane, and stayed in a well-placed hotel from which we were able to travel to central Paris by Metro in just ten minutes. When we arrived in Paris, we spent some time in a local shop where we practised our French before eating in the hotel restaurant.

On our first day, we visited the second floor of the Eiffel Tower where we enjoyed a magnificent view over Paris, followed by a picnic lunch in a park with a view of the Eiffel Tower. In the afternoon, we went on a cruise on the River Seine. We were able to see different areas of Paris and its beautiful bridges and palaces, in the warm sunshine. We also sailed past the Notre Dame Cathedral, which was badly damaged by fire in 2019. Afterwards, we made our way by subway to the tallest building in Paris, the Montparnasse Tower which we visited after our dinner in a local restaurant. Arriving on the top floor of the Montparnasse Tower we were able to watch a short film explaining how Paris has changed through the years, from its beginnings as a small village in the countryside, to the large, busy capital city that it is today. At the end of the day, we made our way back to the hotel where we were happy to relax after a long day walking round the city.

On Sunday, after having another delicious breakfast at the hotel, we travelled by Metro to the Arc de Triomphe and made our way along the Champs Élysées Avenue where some of us stopped at the PSG football team shop to buy souvenirs. As we reached the end of the Champs Élysées we arrived at the Louvres Museum; we took many photos of the iconic pyramid before going to 'Les Halles', one of the biggest shopping malls in Paris, where we spent time shopping and using our wonderful French speaking skills in real life. We then all went for a crêpe and a milkshake in a lovely local restaurant before heading to the Sacré Coeur Basilica in Montmartre. When we arrived there, we had to climb the many steps leading to the top of the Basilica in very hot and sunny weather. After that, we walked around the Place de Tertre in Montmartre where we were able to buy souvenirs of Paris. Finally, for our last evening meal in Paris, we found the perfect dish to try: 'Les escargots' (snails!) and some of us really appreciated the garlic and parsley taste of them.

On our last day, we went to a local shop where some of us bought some souvenirs or French delicacies, before preparing our suitcases for our return to England. The coach picked us up, we took the plane back and everybody went home... Au revoir Paris!

We had a wonderful time in Paris and it was nice to see all of our students trying their French speaking skills. Our students were fantastic! Thank you to them for being on their best behaviour and thank you to Mrs Smith and Miss Keenan for coming with us.
